
Title: Bill is back

Gravity Falls is an animated mystery-comedy series created by Alex Hirsch that aired on Disney Channel and Disney XD from 2012 to 2016. The show follows the adventures of 12-year-old twins, Dipper and Mabel Pines, who are sent to spend the summer with their great-uncle, or "Grunkle," Stan, in the small, seemingly ordinary town of Gravity Falls, Oregon. However, they soon discover that the town is far from normal and is filled with strange creatures, supernatural occurrences, and cryptic mysteries. But what if *Gravity Falls* is more than just a children's show?

About page:

I worked on Gravity Falls from 2012 to 2016. Heard conversations, saw the writing, and recordings. My job was to bring the characters and the whole world to life. Little did I know that the places, and the moments I was drawing, were already based on real life. It's time that everyone who watched and enjoyed

the treasure hunt that Gravity Falls was, knows the truth. Just like the audience has grown up, so has the plot. Gravity Falls is much bigger than what fits on a screen.

Research:

After the show ended, Hirsch decided to take the show a step further. "As *Gravity Falls* is a show about mystery, Hirsch wanted to give fans one final mystery that no one was expecting and that no show had ever done before." He set up the Cipher hunt. The "Cipher Hunt was an ARG (alternate reality game) about *Gravity Falls*, created by series creator Alex Hirsch. The goal of the entire game was to find an actual statue of Bill Cipher, briefly glimpsed in the series finale, by retrieving and decoding clues hidden in various locations around the world. The first ones to the statue received a prize, though the hunt was mainly about the journey and not the destination. It began on July 20, 2016 and was finished on August 2, 2016."

Alex Hirsch, the creator of *Gravity Falls*, has a known penchant for inserting real-world mysteries and conspiracy theories into his work. In interviews, Hirsch has hinted that the show's concept of a journal containing secret knowledge was inspired by his fascination with the mysterious *Voynich Manuscript*; an ancient, undeciphered book believed by some to hold esoteric or even alien knowledge.

Bill Cipher, the show's primary antagonist, is often depicted as a one-eyed triangle. This symbol has deep roots in real-world occult practices, often associated with secret societies like the Freemasons or the Illuminati. The recurring image of a pyramid with an eye mirrors the *Eye of Providence* found on the back of U.S. dollar bills—a symbol widely speculated to represent hidden control by secret organizations. What's more, Bill Cipher's ability to manipulate time and space is oddly reminiscent of conspiracy theories surrounding real government projects, like *Project Montaut*; an alleged U.S. military experiment focused on time travel and psychic warfare. Several fans have pointed out that Bill's signature line, "Reality is an illusion, the universe is a hologram," seems too close to actual theories about simulated realities and quantum research being conducted by top-secret government labs.

Throughout *Gravity Falls*, cryptic ciphers and codes are scattered in nearly every episode. One code, deciphered by fans in the episode "Dipper and Mabel vs. The Future," reads: "The answers lie just beyond the forest." While this line appears innocuous at first, some fans used the Caesar cipher to uncover an interesting set of coordinates hidden in another episode, *Society of the Blind Eye*. These coordinates point to a remote area of the Pacific Northwest known for its deep forests and difficult-to-access terrain. Strangely, local maps reveal that this region is located within a government-restricted area, specifically part of an old Cold War research facility now closed to the public.

There are multiple crossovers within shows created by some of the four writers of the show. Four writers worked on the production of Gravity Falls. Alex Hirsch was the original creator and is said to have based a lot of the show on his own childhood memories. Josh Weinstein is of course also known for his work on *The Simpsons* which coincidentally is also known for its eerily accurate predictions of the future. Aury Wallington has written extensively for TV and has her own published science fiction book. Last, but not least, Shion Takeuchi was the creator of the show *Inside Job*; an animated show all about conspiracy theories. Stan's objects that fly through a portal in an episode of Gravity Falls are seen in an episode of

Rick and Morty, where they are going through portals into other dimensions. In an episode of the Simpsons, Bill Cipher appears as a character.
